HISTORY OF CONSERVATION AUTHORITIES
 The passage of the Conservation Authorities Act in 1946 paved the way for Ontario's conservation authorities to begin forming. The legislation also provided municipalities and the province with a new way to tackle water and erosion problems, and undertake initiatives for natural resource management. At the time, agriculture, sportsmen and naturalist groups were concerned about the unhealthy state of the natural resources due to land, water and forestry practices of the day. Ontario now has 36 conservation authorities.
